



Quality Supportive Housing for People with Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities

(What everyone <u>really</u> needs to know)

Supportive housing is a home in a neighborhood just like everybody else's. There are many types of housing with support services. They can be apartments or single-family dwellings, owned or rented.

What is Supportive Housing?

- 1. Affordable
- 2. Tenants have leases
- 3. Services unique to each person's needs
- 4. Connects tenants to local neighborhood
- 5. Eliminates barriers to independent living
- 6. Service provider, tenant, family and landlord work together

Three ways to establish Supportive Housing Services:

- 1. Provider Agency hires support
- 2. Parents/Siblings hire support
- 3. Self-Advocate hires support

Self-advocates in supportive housing must have funding (Intermittent CILA or Home-Based Support Services) to pay for services. Because many self—advocates have a limited income from Social Security and/or employment, the housing is funded through a subsidy.
