HOW MFTD WAIVER FAMILIES BEGAN

In 2011, Healthcare and Family Services (HFS) began discussing eliminating or restructuring the MFTD Waiver

Children with Complex Medical Needs (CCMN) Workgroup Meeting Notes

Director Hamos reported that HFS has been directed to cut \$2.7B from its budget (approximately 25% of the entire budget). The budget is very bleak and in the next few weeks programs will be reviewed and legislators will make decisions on what cuts will be made. Unfortunately, everything is on the table for cuts, even small cost programs. Subsequently, the waiver and waivers that disregard family income are under scrutiny. The current 300 percent Federal Poverty Level (FPL) is also under review and could be reduced.

There was significant discussion from the group on the risks of discontinuing this program such as forcing parents to give up jobs, drop insurance or give up custody of children. There was an appeal for the Department to carefully analyze the cost of dropping the program and choosing more flexible options such as providing services based on actual needs and making the program more flexible. OUR FIRST FIGHT

2012 Changes to MFTD Waiver

- Restrict program to lower income families
- Add premiums and copays
- Replace nurses with unskilled aides
- Reduce program level of care leading to less hours of home care
- Cut reimbursement rates

"Section 1. Short title. This Act may be referred to as the Save Medicaid Access and Resources Together (SMART) Act.

Sec. 5-2b. Medically fragile and technology dependent children eligibility and program. On and after September 1, 2012, subject to federal approval, medical assistance under this Article shall be available to children who qualify as persons with a disability, as defined under the federal Supplemental Security Income program and who are medically fragile and technology dependent. The program shall allow eligible children to receive the medical assistance provided under this Article in the community, shall be limited to families with income up to 500% of the federal poverty level, and must maximize, to the fullest extent permissible under federal law, federal reimbursement and family cost-sharing, contributions, except that the Department shall be permitted to incentivize the utilization of selected services through the use of cost-sharing adjustments. The Department shall establish the policies, procedures, standards, services, and criteria for this program by rule.

ADVOCACY: BIG AND SMALL

Big

- Change laws
- Civil rights lawsuits

Small

- Support or oppose a bill
- Submit comments on legislation/program
- Seek changes to program
- Work with other groups for federal change

EXAMPLE LEGAL SUCCESSES

Boyce vs. Hamos

Filed to prevent the state from making changes to the MFTD waiver that would have eliminated/reduced home nursing services

Withdrawn once the legislature and HFS reversed course

Hampe vs. Hamos

Allowed adults over age 21 in MFTD waiver to receive the same number of home nursing hours

Settled and now codified in program

MA vs. Bellock

Addressed cuts in nursing care hours for primarily non-waiver children

Settled in 2019

OB vs. Eagleson

Addressed the state's failure to provide approved home nursing services

Settled in 2019
