
11+ Republicans wrote a letter opposing Medicaid cuts

3,438,447 people in Illinois covered by Medicaid




222,693 people with disabilities receive home and community based services



16,589 people with disabilities already on waiting lists for services







Illinois received \$21 Billion for Medicaid from the federal government in 2023



The federal government pays about half (51%) of most Medicaid costs in Illinois



The federal government pays even more for certain populations, such as 90% for those in the ACA Adult category





# Where Are We in the Process? Budget Reconciliation

House and Senate pass budget resolutions that say how much to fund each "bucket"

House decides exactly what to cut

where we are now!

Senate decides exactly what to cut

House and Senate work to resolve differences

Budget reconciliation bills are passed, signed by president, and put in place



# Why Do We "Need" Cuts? Hint: We Don't...It's a Choice

To pay for \$4.5 trillion dollars in tax cuts

"Fraud, Waste, Abuse"

Corporate greed

Fraud and abuse is already minimal and detected

More money for the ultrawealthy

Cuts would have no direct effect on fraud, waste, and abuse

# Most Likely Cut: Work Requirements

Requiring all adults, usually 18-65, to work at least part time to continue receiving Medicaid

- Usually are exemptions for those in school, those with young children, and those who are disabled or sick
- No exemption typically for caregivers of people with disabilities
- Exemptions require extensive paperwork and documentation





#### Work Status & Barriers to Work Among Medicaid Adults, 2023

Includes Medicaid covered adults (age 19-64) who do not receive benefits from Supplemental Security Income (SSI) or Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) and are not also covered by Medicare.



### Who Falls in the Gap?

- Individual providing **caregiving** for an elderly parent or person with disability
- Individual with a disability but not "disabled enough"
- Gig and freelance workers
- Those with unexpected job losses

# Work Requirements Don't Work

# Past Failures

Arkansas – 95% met work or exemption requirements, but 1 in 4 still lost Medicaid; program cost \$26 million

Georgia – 80% of costs went to administration; only 5% gained Medicaid coverage; cost \$80 million

Work rates did not increase

Savings comes from people losing Medicaid People with disabilities and the elderly are most likely to lose Medicaid

### Work Requirements Medicaid Loss Predictions

#### Estimates for Medicaid losses

- 1,351,000 or 46% of Illinois adults could lose Medicaid
- 36 million total Americans could lose Medicaid
- Job losses in Illinois: 13,300-18,500

# Potential Cut: Per Capita Cap

### A fixed amount paid per person

- Could apply to everybody or just certain populations
- ACA population is biggest target

#### Starts with a CUT

 Always includes a baseline cut in total dollars

#### The Cut deepens

 Each year, the amount received becomes less and less compared to the amount needed

### Cannot respond to changes

- pandemics
- natural disasters
- aging populations


# Hits people with high costs the hardest

- People with disabilities
- People who are elderly











# Per Capita Caps — Estimated Medicaid and Financial Losses

#### Per Capita Cap on All

- 5.8 million lose Medicaid
- 2.9 million increase in uninsured


### Per Capita Cap on ACA Expansion Group

- 3.3 million lose Medicaid
- 1.5 million increase in uninsured

### A Per Capita Cap on the Expansion Population Would Erode the Effective Enhanced Federal Match Rate for the Expansion Population Over Time

Federal share of Medicaid spending (or the effective FMAP) for the ACA expansion population by year if states maintain ACA expansion coverage and spending





# Potential Cut: Reducing Federal Matching Percentages

The federal government pays at least 50% of Medicaid costs for most services

- Currently 51% in Illinois
- Reducing this percentage means significantly less money for Illinois



For the ACA population, the federal government currently pays 90%

- Illinois has a trigger law opting out of Medicaid expansion if this rate is cut
- \$41 billion loss over 10 years for Illinois
- 840,000 people could lose Medicaid in Illinois – 28% reduction
- 5.5 million lose Medicaid, 2.4 million increase in uninsured across the US

**Additional Penalty**: States that provide any healthcare coverage to noncitizens could be penalized further with an additional cut, even though no federal dollars are used for this care.

# Big Likely Cuts to Odds and End

### Provider Taxes


- Help states fund Medicaid
  - 8.6 million lose Medicaid
  - 3.9 million increase in uninsured

# Repeal Eligibility and Enrollment Rules

- Makes people recertify eligibility more frequently
  - 2.3 million lose Medicaid
  - 0.6 million increase in uninsured



# Why Target the ACA Expansion Population?

Able-bodied young people who choose not to work



People with disabilities or chronic conditions



Most common demographic is women over 40 who used to work and are now caregivers for elderly parents or people with disabilities

Governor Pritzker estimate: \$8 billion dollars less per year



## How Can Illinois Make Up the Difference?

Make cuts to optional Medicaid services

Reduce reimbursement rates to providers Reduce who is allowed to get Medicaid

Raise more revenue through taxes, fees, and other programs

Make cuts to other Illinois programs



# Past Experience (2011 FMAP Reduction)

Illinois cut participants in Home Health by 11%

Illinois cut spending in Waivers by 4% 33 states spent less on IDD waivers (avg. 10.8% less)

40 states cut Home Health spending or participation

ALL states made cuts to HCBS

# Optional Medicaid Services That Can Be Cut

### Optional Adult Medicaid services

- Home nursing care
- Dental care
- Physical, occupational, speech therapy
- Prescription drugs
- Dentures, prosthetics, and eyeglasses
- Hospice
- ICF/DD and Mental Health Institutions
- Personal Care and related programs
- Case management

### Medicaid (Disability) Waivers

- Waivers could be completely eliminated
- Number of spots reduced = longer waiting lists
- Reduced Services
- Lowered Cost Maximums

### Effective Meeting Strategies

### DO

- Be concise and respectful of their time
- Clearly state what you're asking for
- Share your personal story and the 'why'
- Leave behind a one-page fact sheet

### DON'T

- Read directly from materials (if possible)
- Be confrontational or threatening
- Overwhelm with too many issues or statistics
- Be discouraged to meet with staff instead of legislators
