Education

ISBE Illinois State Board of Education

What do they do?

- The State Board consists of nine members who are appointed by the Governor with the consent of the Senate. Board members serve four-year terms, with State Board membership limited to two consecutive terms.
- The board sets educational policies and guidelines for public and private schools, preschool through grade 12, as well as vocational education. It analyzes the aims, needs and requirements of education and recommends legislation to the General Assembly and Governor for the benefit of the more than 2 million school children in Illinois.

Why do I need to know about ISBE?

ISBE oversees education for all students in Illinois. The Special Education Department assures that these programs and services meet state and federal requirements. This involves both compliance and technical assistance functions.



IEP	Individualized Education Program
What does this do?	After qualifying for special education services, the IEP documents the goals, objectives and special services (therapies, etc.) for which your child qualifies in order to benefit from their public-school education.
Why do I need to know about this?	If your child qualifies for an IEP, this document guides their education in the public schools and is a legally binding document outlining what your child needs to be successful in school.

Illinois Services for People with Disabilities



IDHS (or just DHS)	Illinois Department of Human Services
What does this do?	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • This is the “umbrella” agency under which several departments exist that provide services for Illinois residents. • For our purposes today, we will focus on departments that serve People With Disabilities (PWD – another acronym!)
Why do I need to know about IDHS?	You may get letters from IDHS that explain or approve/deny services from the agencies that serve PWD.

HCBS

Home and Community Based Services Waiver Programs

What does this do?

A waiver is a program that provides services that allow individuals to remain in their own homes or live in a community setting, instead of in an institution. Illinois has nine HCBS waivers.

Why do I need to know about it?

- If a person is at risk of needing institutional level of care, then these programs help them stay in their home and/or community and receive services there instead of in a nursing home or institution.
- If a loved one will need help living independently (bathing, dressing, cooking, feeding, paying bills/managing money, etc.) then these services can provide this support if eligible.

DDD

Division of Developmental Disabilities

What does this do?

The DDD oversees and provides services for people in Illinois with Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities (IDD).

Why do I need to know about it?


This division oversees three Home and Community Based Services (HCBS) also known as Medicaid Waivers:

- Adults with Developmental Disabilities Waiver
- Children with Developmental Disabilities Support Waiver
- Children with Developmental Disabilities Residential Waiver

DDD also oversees the PUNS database, which is a registry of people who are waiting for any of the above HCBS.

ISC	Independent Service Coordination office
What does this do?	ISCs are the point of entry for services from DDD.
Why do I need to know about it?	You must contact your area's ISC to apply for services/be put on the PUNS (see next slide) list if eligible.

PUNS	Acronym no longer valid!
What does this do?	PUNS is the database of people who are waiting for HCBS from the DDD in Illinois.
Why do I need to know about it?	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • If you have a loved one with IDD that needs or will need help living independently, then the pathway to services from the DDD is to apply through your Independent Service Coordination (ISC!). If eligible, your loved one will be put on the PUNS database. • Pulls from the PUNS database happen based on time on the list only.

DD Waiver acronyms

CILA	Community Integrated Living Arrangement
I-CILA	Intermittent Community Living Arrangement (typically 15 hours/week of support)
ICF-DD	Intermediate Care Facility for people with Developmental Disabilities
SODC	State Operated Developmental Center
SDA	Self-Directed Assistant – an option under DD waiver Self-Directed option
PSW	Personal Support Worker
DSP	Direct Support Professional

DRS

Division of Rehabilitation Services, sometimes “DoRS”

What does this do?

DRS works in partnership with people with disabilities and their families to assist them in making informed choices to achieve full community participation through employment, education, and independent living opportunities.

Why do I need to know about DRS?

VR	Vocational Rehabilitation or Voc Rehab
What is this?	We help people with disabilities find and keep jobs. Our goal is to help our customers find quality employment that pays a living wage and offers a chance for advancement.
Why do I need to know about it?	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • They help high school students who have disabilities plan for their futures after high school graduation through our Transition and STEP programs. • Their Supported Employment Program (SEP) serves eligible people with significant disabilities who want to go to work and need on-going support services to succeed on the job.

HSP

Home Services Program

What does this do?

This is DRS' umbrella program that provides HCBS. It helps people with disabilities stay in their own homes and get the services they need.

- Personal Assistant (PA as opposed to PSW under DD)
- Homemaker Services
- Maintenance Home Health (services prescribed by a physician)
- Assistive Equipment
- Environmental Modifications, and more.


Why do I need to know about this?

- This program has no waiting list (but you still need to meet eligibility)
- May be sufficient to meet the current needs for people with IDD.
- If eligible, you can be on the HSP while waiting to be pulled from PUNS.

HFS	Illinois Department of Healthcare and Family Services
What does this do?	The Illinois Department of Healthcare and Family Services (HFS) is responsible for providing healthcare coverage for adults and children who qualify for Medicaid, and for providing child support services to help ensure that Illinois children receive financial support from both parents. The agency is organized into two major divisions, Medical Programs and Child Support Services.
Why do I need to know about this?	If your loved one is on Medicaid or will be, this is the agency that oversees this basic and vital resource.




Programs under HFS

ACA Adults: Affordable Care Act	Under the Affordable Care Act (ACA), adults age 19-64 who were not previously eligible for coverage under Medicaid can now receive medical coverage. Individuals with income up to 138 percent of the federal poverty level (monthly income of \$1,366/individual, \$1,845/couple) can be covered.
AABD: Aid to Aged Blind and Disabled	Covers seniors, persons who are blind and persons with disabilities with income up to 100 percent of the federal poverty level (FPL) and no more than \$17,500 of non-exempt resources (one person). Federal matching funds are available under Medicaid for these individuals.
DCFS: Department of Children and Family Services	Coverage is provided to children whose care is subsidized by DCFS under Title IV-E (Child Welfare) of the Social Security Act as well as children served by DCFS through its subsidized guardianship and adoption assistance programs.
All Kids (not an acronym but important to mention)	A health insurance program for children living in Illinois who need insurance. Children must be 18 or younger.

ADA

The Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) protects people with disabilities from discrimination. Disability rights are civil rights.

The Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) is a law that makes available a free appropriate public education to eligible children with disabilities throughout the nation and ensures special education and related services to those children, supports early intervention services for infants and toddlers and their families, and awards competitive discretionary grants.


PTICs

Social Security Administration

What does this do?


Provides financial protection for our nation's people. They can help you through all life's journeys. [About Social Security | SSA](#)

Why do I need to know about SSA?

Administers [benefits](#) like Retirement, Disability, Survivor, and Family.
Also manages Supplemental Security Income (SSI), enroll people in Medicare, and issue Social Security [numbers and cards](#).

SSI

Supplemental Security Income

What is this?

SSI provides monthly payments to adults and children who have income and resources below specific financial limits, and who meet one of the following criteria:


- They are age 65 or older.
- They are blind.
- They have a medical condition that keeps them from performing substantial gainful activity, which is expected to last one year or result in death

Why do I need to know about this?

Your loved one may qualify for these payments if they meet the eligibility criteria.

SSDI

Social Security Disability Insurance

What is this?

Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) or “Disability” provides monthly payments to people who have a disability that stops or limits their ability to work.

Why do I need to know about this:

Your loved one may qualify for SSDI if a parent starts receiving Social Security benefits based on their own earnings when they retire, become disabled themselves, or pass away.

If your loved one works, they may qualify for SSDI on their own earnings.

After receiving SSDI benefits for 24 months --> Medicare

Medicare

Not an acronym!

What is this?

Medicare is health insurance for people 65 or older. You may be eligible to get Medicare earlier if you have a disability, End-Stage Renal Disease (ESRD), or ALS (also called Lou Gehrig's disease).

Why do I need to know about this?

Your loved one may be eligible for Medicare once they have received SSDI benefits for 24 months.
