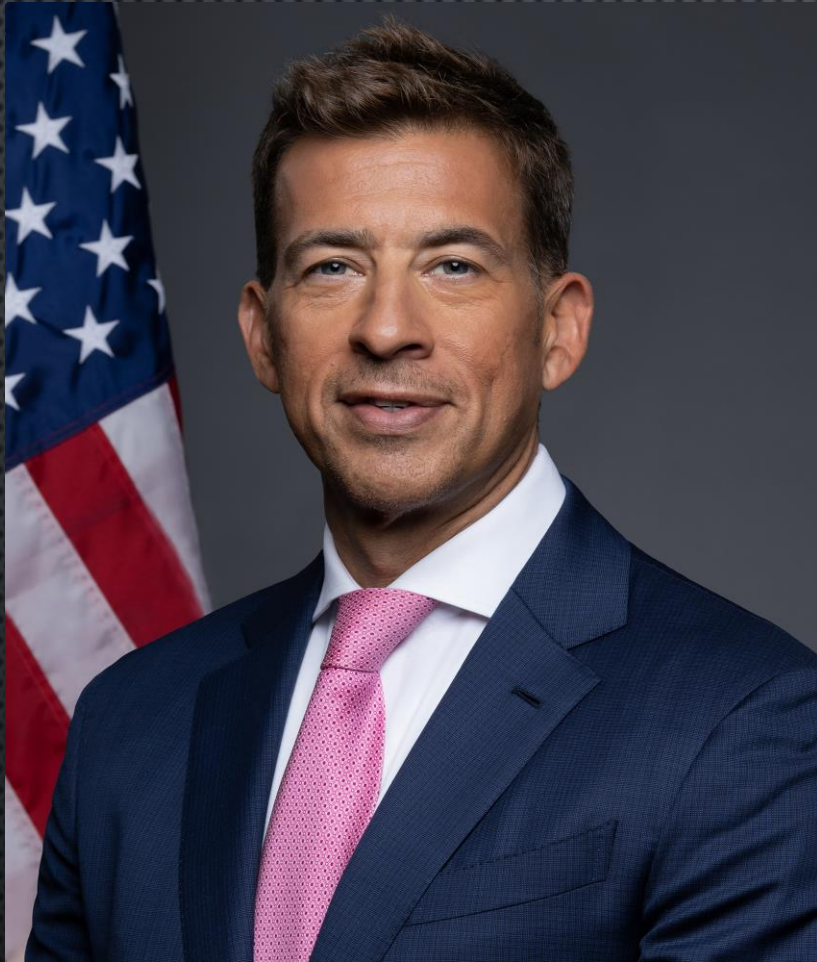

Effective February 1, 2026, TSA is charging a \$45 fee for all travelers including travelers with disabilities who do not have a REAL ID compliant driver's license or ID card to board a domestic flight.

To help avoid the fee, the Secretary of State's Office is making it easier for people to apply for a Real ID card, all applicants must provide proof of identity listing their full legal name, proof of SSN, and two current residency documents.

STEP 2: Make a DMV appointment or visit our REAL ID Supercenter in downtown Chicago

STEP 3: Receive your temporary REAL ID with original to follow within 15 days

- You have a valid U.S. Passport or passport card. You must bring your passport with you when you fly domestically.
- You do not use airplanes as a mode of domestic transportation;
- You do not visit military bases; or
- You do not visit secure federal facilities.

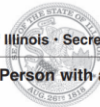

Definition Supplement

Chapter 15, Illinois Compiled Statutes, Section 335/4A defines:

Types of Disabilities

Type One: Physical (P)

A physical disability is a physical impairment, disease, or loss, which is of a permanent nature, and which substantially limits physical ability or motor skills.

Type Two: Developmental (D)

Developmental disability means a disability that is attributable to: (i) an intellectual disability, cerebral palsy, epilepsy, or autism or (ii) any other condition that results in impairment similar to that caused by an intellectual disability and requires services similar to those required by persons with intellectual disabilities. Such a disability must originate before the age of 18 years, be expected to continue indefinitely, and constitute a substantial handicap.

Type Three: Visual (V)

A visual disability is blindness, and the term "blindness" means central vision acuity of 20/200 or less in the better eye with the use of a correcting lens. An eye that is accompanied by a limitation in the fields of vision so that the widest diameter of the visual field subtends an angle no greater than 20 degrees shall be considered as having a central vision acuity of 20/200 or less.

Type Four: Hearing (H)

A hearing disability is a disability resulting in complete absence of hearing, or hearing that with sound enhancing or magnifying equipment is so impaired as to require the use of sensory input other than hearing as the principal means of receiving spoken language.

Type Five: Mental (M)

A mental disability is a significant impairment of an individual's cognitive, affective, or relational abilities that may require intervention and may be a recognized, medically diagnosable illness or disorder.

Classifications of Disabilities

Class 1

A Class 1 disability is any type of disability which does **not** render a person unable to engage in any substantially gainful activity, or which does not impair the person's ability to live independently or to perform labor or services for which he/she is qualified.

Class 1a

A Class 1a disability is a Class 1 disability which renders a person unable to walk 200 feet or more unassisted by another person or without the aid of a walker, crutches, braces, prosthetic device or a wheelchair, or without great difficulty or discomfort due to the following impairments: neurologic, orthopedic, oncological, respiratory, cardiac, arthritic disorder, blindness, or the loss of function or absence of a limb or limbs.

Class 2

A Class 2 disability is any type of disability which renders a person unable to engage in any substantially gainful activity, or which substantially impairs the person's ability to live independently without supervision or in-home support services, or which substantially impairs the person's ability to perform labor or services for which he/she is qualified or significantly restricts the labor or services which he/she is able to perform.

Class 2a

A Class 2a disability is a Class 2 disability which renders a person unable to walk 200 feet or more unassisted by another person or without the aid of a walker, crutches, braces, prosthetic device or a wheelchair, or without great difficulty or discomfort due to the following impairments: neurologic, orthopedic, oncological, respiratory, cardiac, arthritic disorder, blindness, or the loss of function or absence of a limb or limbs.

HOMEBOUND STATE ID CARD SERVICES

- CERTAIN DOCUMENTS ARE REQUIRED TO OBTAIN THE STATE IDENTIFICATION CARD. SECRETARY OF STATE STAFF WILL DETERMINE ELIGIBILITY AND THE DOCUMENTS REQUIRED

EMERGENCY CONTACT DATABASE



The Illinois Secretary of State's Emergency Contact Database allows you to enter emergency contact information, as well as disability/special needs information, into a voluntary, secure database at no charge. In the event you are involved in a motor vehicle crash or other emergency where you are unable to communicate, law enforcement can access this information and notify your designated emergency contacts, as well as provide any helpful information to emergency/medical personnel at the scene.

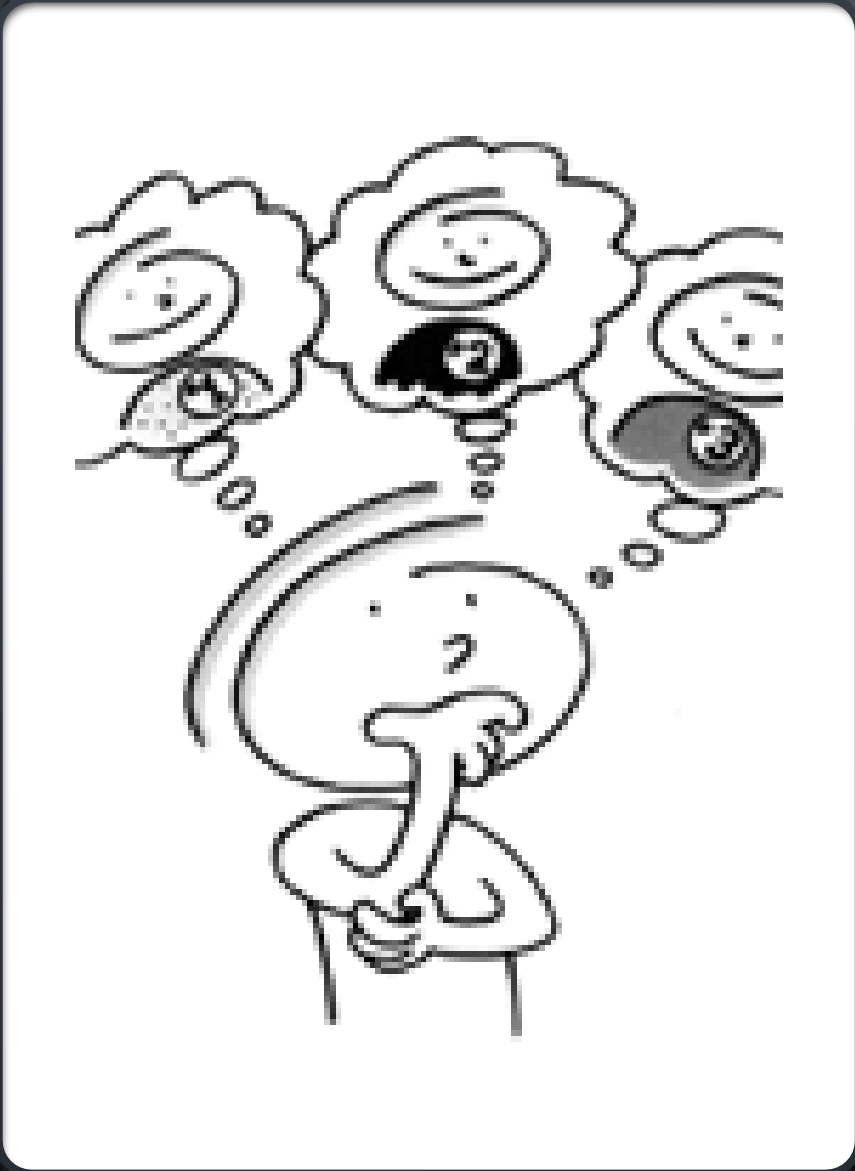

- There is NO FEE to enroll! Anyone who has an Illinois driver's license, Disabled or State Identification card can voluntarily enter their emergency contact information into the database.
- You may select one or two people as emergency contacts. Emergency contact do not need to reside in Illinois. It is your responsibility to notify the individuals you have listed as emergency contacts.
- You may include information or medical issues/conditions including disabilities or drug allergies.
- You may add, modify or delete information at any time at www.ilsos.gov . Any modifications or deletions will overwrite ALL previously information.
- Only law enforcement may access this information and use it only in the case of an emergency when you are unable to communicate with them directly.

HOW TO OBTAIN A PARKING PLACARD AND/OR DISABILITY LICENSE PLATES

All states including Illinois have some type of an application process.

A certification form is required to be completed by a licensed physician or nurse practitioner attesting that the person meets the eligibility requirements of the program.

Persons with Disabilities Certification for Parking Placard

This form is valid for six months from your physician's signature date for a temporary placard.
 This form is valid for four years from your physician's signature date for a permanent placard.

Note to disability license plate owners: If you have a disability license plate, you **must** complete this form and renew your placard.

Part 3: Medical Eligibility Standards and Medical Professional Certification

As the medical professional(s) completing this document and verifying the applicant's disability, I understand that making a false representation of a person's disability to get any type of disabled parking placard may result in suspension or revocation of my license and a fine of up to \$1,000. As a licensed medical professional authorized under Section 1-159.1 and 3-616 of the Illinois Vehicle Code or a licensed optometrist or chiropractor, I certify that the applicant has a condition that constitutes them as a person with disabilities.

Part 4: Medical Eligibility for Meter-Exempt Parking

The meter-exempt parking certification must be completed only when the applicant qualifies. To qualify, the applicant **must have a valid Illinois driver's license**, have an ambulatory disability, as described in Part 3, and also have one of the following conditions listed below. **Economic need is not a consideration for meter-exempt parking.**

The applicant is eligible for meter-exempt parking as provided by statute due to the following **permanent** medical condition or disability:

Check all that apply:

- Cannot manage, manipulate, or insert coins or obtain tickets in parking meters/ticket machines due to lack of fine motor control of BOTH hands.
 Cannot reach above their head to a height of 42 inches from the ground due to a lack of finger, hand or upper-extremity strength, or mobility.
 Cannot approach a parking meter due to the use of a wheelchair or other device for mobility.
 Cannot walk more than 20 feet due to an orthopedic, a neurological, a cardiovascular, or a lung condition in which the degree of debilitation is so severe that it almost completely impedes the ability to walk.
 Missing a hand(s) or arm(s) or has permanently lost the use of a hand or arm.
 Patient is under 18 years of age and incapable of driving.

FALSIFYING DISABILITY INFORMATION IS A CRIME

Fraud and abuse of the Parking Program for Persons with Disabilities is a serious problem. Medical professionals can be part of the solution. Falsifying information about the nature of a disability in order to qualify for a disability parking placard and/or license plates is a crime — whether committed by the applicant or the medical professional.

An applicant faces a 12-month suspension of driving privileges, a fine of up to \$2,500 and revocation of parking privileges.

Only individuals with a permanent disability who meet more stringent medical requirements qualify for meter-exempt parking. Medical professionals who certify an application for any patient who does not meet the disability criteria face a Class A misdemeanor, a minimum fine of \$1,000 and possible driver's license suspension.

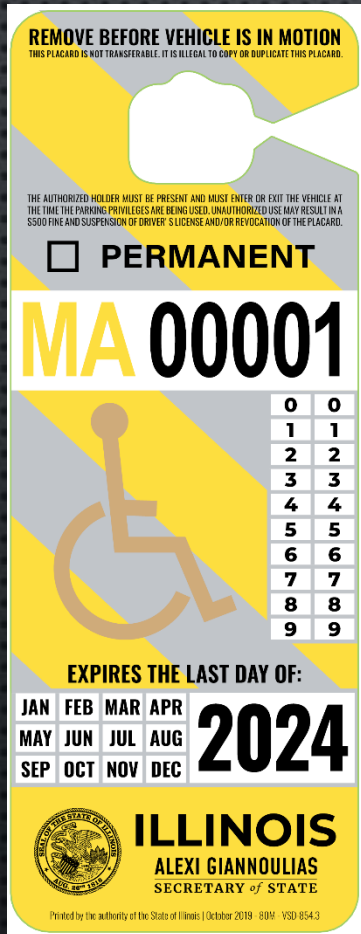

METER-EXEMPT PERMANENT PARKING PLACARD



In order to qualify for a meter-exempt placard, a person must have a permanent disability and

- have a valid Illinois driver's license or be under the age of 18 and incapable of driving
- meet a more stringent eligibility criteria attested by a physician

NON-METER EXEMPT PERMANENT PARKING PLACARD



- Issued to persons with permanent disabilities.
- Allows the authorized holder to park in Accessible Parking spaces such as at a mall, grocery, or retail store but **DOES NOT** exempt the authorized holder from the payment of parking meter fees and time limitations at parking meters.
- Allows the authorized holder to park in any On-Street Accessible Parking space.

TEMPORARY PLACARDS



- For persons with a temporary disability
- Valid for 6 months or less if issued by the Secretary of State
- Valid for up to 90 days if issued by local townships/municipalities
- Allows the authorized holder to park in spaces reserved for persons with disabilities such as at a mall, grocery, or store but **DOES NOT** exempt the authorized holder from the payment of parking meter fees.

ORGANIZATION PLACARDS



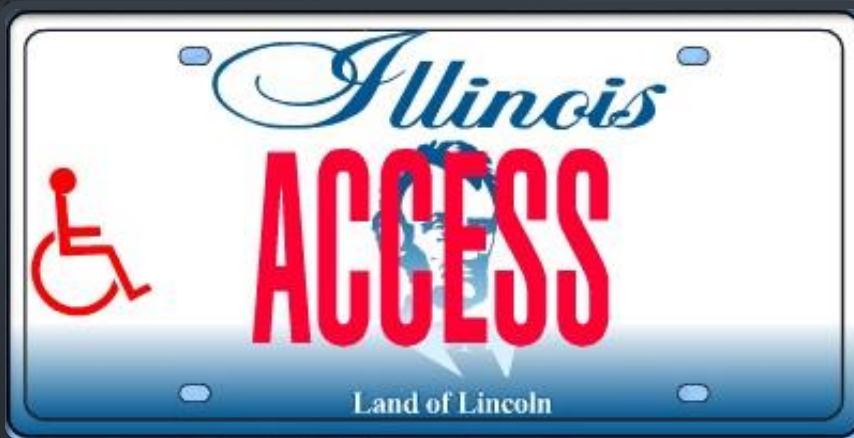
- ISSUED TO NON-PROFIT ORGANIZATIONS THAT TRANSPORT PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES.
- ALLOWS THE AUTHORIZED ORGANIZATION TO PARK IN SPACES RESERVED FOR PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES SUCH AS AT A MALL, GROCERY, OR RETAIL STORE IF THEY ARE LOADING OR UNLOADING DISABLED PASSENGERS BUT **DOES NOT** EXEMPT THE ORGANIZATION FROM THE PAYMENT OF PARKING METER FEES.

DISABILITY LICENSE PLATES

- ISSUED ONLY TO PERSONS WITH A PERMANENT DISABILITY. THEIR NAME MUST BE ON THE VEHICLE TITLE, OR THE PARENT OR LEGAL GUARDIAN OF A MINOR WITH A DISABILITY OR AN IMMEDIATE FAMILY MEMBER RESIDING IN THE SAME HOUSEHOLD.

- ALLOWS THE AUTHORIZED HOLDER TO PARK IN ACCESSIBLE PARKING SPACES SUCH AS AT A MALL, OR RETAIL STORE BUT DOES NOT EXEMPT THE AUTHORIZED HOLDER FROM THE PAYMENT OF PARKING METER FEES AND TIME LIMITATIONS AT PARKING METERS.

- PARKING METER EXEMPTIONS ARE ALLOWED ONLY IF THE MOTOR VEHICLE ALSO DISPLAYS THE APPROPRIATE PARKING PLACARD (YELLOW/GRAY STRIPED) FOR METER EXEMPT PARKING.



THE AUTHORIZED HOLDER

The authorized holder is defined as the qualified person with the disability to whom the placard or disability license plates are issued.

Placards are issued to the authorized holder and not to a vehicle.

The placard can be used in any vehicle that the authorized holder is driving or is a passenger in.

Placards are NOT TRANSFERABLE!



- **IN ILLINOIS, PARKING IN AN ACCESSIBLE SPACE WITHOUT A PARKING PLACARD OR DISABILITY LICENSE PLATE IS A MINIMUM \$250 FINE. (625 ILCS 5/11-1301.3) MUNICIPALITIES CAN INCREASE THE FINE TO \$350 BY ADOPTING A LOCAL ORDINANCE.**
- **PARKING IN THE ACCESS AISLE – VERTICAL LINES ADJACENT TO THE ACCESSIBLE PARKING SPACE IS A \$250 FINE EVEN IF THE VEHICLE IS DISPLAYING A PLACARD OR DISABILITY PLATES.**

UNLAWFUL USE OF PLACARDS OR DISABILITY LICENSE PLATES

- UNLAWFUL USE OF A PLACARD OR LICENSE PLATES IS A VIOLATION OF STATE LAW UNDER ILCS 625 5/11-301.3(A-1) AND IS A \$600 MINIMUM FINE AND A 6-MONTH DRIVER'S LICENSE SUSPENSION.
- POLICE OFFICERS MAY CONFISCATE UNLAWFULLY USED PLACARDS AND RETURN THEM WITH A REPORT AND/OR A COPY OF THE CITATION TO THE SECRETARY OF STATE TO TAKE DRIVER'S LICENSE SANCTIONS AGAINST THE USER. INFORMATION SHOULD BE SENT TO THE SECRETARY OF STATE AT:

More than 70,000 digital titles — some in foreign languages — are available, including bestsellers, light fiction, westerns, classics and nonfiction. Over 100 magazine titles are also available, with new titles continually added to the collection.

In Illinois, 11 stations under Illinois Radio Services provide current information from local newspapers. Free closed-band receivers allow patrons to listen to broadcasts of local news, grocery ads and other information not available through the Talking Book Program. - ✓ When the officer gets to your car, let them know you have a blue envelope, answer the officer's questions, and ask the officer for permission before moving any parts of your body

REGISTER TO VOTE AT ANY SECRETARY OF STATE FACILITY



VOTER REGISTRATION



To register to vote you must:

- 1) Be a Citizen of the United States; and
- 2) Be at least 17 years old on or before the next Primary Election and be at least 18 years old on or before the next General or Consolidated Election.

If you agree to register to vote, your driver's license/identification card application will serve as an application to register to vote. Your application to register to vote will be sent to the Illinois State Board of Elections for the purpose of registering to vote at the residence address indicated on your driver's license or identification card.

Declining to register to vote is confidential and will not affect any services provided by the Secretary of State.

Pursuant to 10 ILCS 5/29-10, submission of a false voter registration application is a Class 3 felony, which is punishable by up to 2-5 years in prison and up to a \$25,000 fine.

Any person convicted of committing perjury on a voter registration application is ineligible for public employment for a period of five years immediately following the completion of his/her sentence. A person who is not a United States Citizen who completes a voter registration application may be subject to deportation and may be refused reentry to the United States.
